

Why Political Ecology Now? A Left Coast Workshop

January 26-28, 2018, Berkeley, California

“The potential power of a popularized political ecology is so great... [and] might make way for a very new world, emerging from these dark times when progressive politics in both human and non-human realms seem so painfully paralyzed.”

(Robbins 2012: 4, cited in Osborne 2017: 844)

In 2015, an interdisciplinary and multi-campus cohort of political ecologists from UC Davis, UC Berkeley, UC Santa Cruz, the University of San Francisco, Portland State University, and the University of British Columbia gathered at the University of California at Berkeley for a two-day workshop to inaugurate the Left Coast Political Ecology (LCPE) working group. This network of graduate students and faculty continues to expand today as new scholars and activists join the field and engage with political ecology's theories and modes of praxis. LCPE now includes junior and senior scholars and practitioners up and down the West Coast -- and beyond.



In this weekend's workshop, our aim is to convene a dedicated, collegial group around the question "why political ecology now?" In thinking through political ecology's responsibility in the present moment, we intend to foster conversations around the field's current theoretical and methodological engagements with racism, colonialism, and other forms of oppression. We ask how we might strengthen our work toward anti-capitalist and anti-fascist ends. These questions are rooted in political ecology's commitments to praxis as well as to critique.

Practically speaking, we hope this weekend's workshop will strengthen our internal networks, building out towards future collaboration and cross-pollination. We hope you will come away from this event with new directions or stronger convictions of existing paths in your own research and activism. Our goal is to cultivate a collective dialogue among West Coast scholars at all stages of their careers, as well as to provide opportunities for new collaborations and senior-junior mentorships to grow.

After welcoming remarks, the workshop will open with a public talk on Friday, 26 January by Dr. Jade Sasser, Assistant Professor in the Department of Gender and Sexuality Studies at the University of California at Riverside, titled "Climate Activism, Reproductive Justice, and Anticipation: Navigating the Intersections." Mentors and mentees will have the opportunity to get acquainted before we all reconvene for dinner. On Saturday, 27 January, we will get to know each others' work through 2-Minute Flash Introductions, followed by workshops and mentoring sessions exploring a series of questions around the key practices, audiences, and collaborators of political ecology in the present moment.

Workshop 1: Methods in Political Ecology: Opportunities, Obstacles, and Political Engagements

In this workshop session, we will first hear from [Tracey Osborne](#) and Diego Martinez-Lugo, Claudia Diaz-Combs, and Pradnya Garud about their research with the [Public Political Ecology Lab](#) at the University of Arizona. In the following discussion, our key questions are: *for whom* do we do political ecology, and *with whom* do we do it? That is, who are our publics and who are our collaborators? In the first part of this session, we will take Tracey Osborne's 2017 article* on Public Political Ecology as our point of departure, hearing from some of its creators how that project came to life.. Next, [Casey Walsh](#) will introduce the [Journal of Political Ecology](#) and we will discuss publishing and reaching diverse audiences through political ecology.
